Partners for Change, Progress Report:

As I mentioned last week, we are delighted to be on the bill at this year's Cookham Festival. Our choirs head off next Friday for a morning of rehearsals before their performance of 'Wind in the Willow' later in the day. With events kicking off this weekend, we hope you find something to enjoy. 'Rogue Opera' who visited school last year during our Arts and Culture Week are performing on Friday 10th May and Toscana Strings, who came more recently to entertain everyone with their version of 'Wind in the Willows' during Book Week, will be back on 11th May with another story set to music, this time 'Monkey Puzzle. On Sunday 19th May several children at our school will be performing at the Oveys Farm Family Concert and former pupil Sean Pow will be on stage at Formosa Fest the day before. The Big Cookham Wildlife Weekend – message from Brian Clews of Wild Cookham:

Well, we are getting nearer the Big Wildlife Weekend of June 22nd/23rd, and so far it has been more like winter than spring! But we are confident the number of creatures that can be found in your garden will be at its peak by our big date.

Hopefully you will have received your packet of seed for your wildflower patch via the school and if you haven't created your mini-meadow yet, there is still time to do so. The packets contain the Adrian Doble seed mix comprising several hundred individual seeds of about 20 different types, so plenty of variety for pollinating insects.

For the weekend itself we are creating ideas of how to take part, including a detailed search under leaves, bricks, and shrubs for spiders and insects, monitoring flowering plants for bees, wasps and hoverflies, a bit of pond-dipping with net and tray for aquatic mini-beasts, and a list of all the birds one sees. We also advocate tapping low branches etc over a tray to see what other amazing bugs and creatures tumble out to be identified. And at night, placing a white sheet over a clothes horse and shining a bright light onto it after dark and wait to see how many types of moth alight upon it.

We are also doing a talk on The Big Weekend as part of the Cookham Festival programme at 12noon Sunday 5th May, so do go to the booking site to get your tickets. https://www.cookhamfestival.co.uk/event-calendar where you can also sign up for our four Nature Walks in the Odney Estate on the Tuesdays and Thursdays. We will have more packets of seed there (also available at Daisies Café) and our pond creation booklets (which are also available at The Little Bookshop).

Parking Update:

I trust you saw my email earlier in the week about parking. Since then, I have spoken to Councillor Mark Howard about what we can all do to increase the safety of pedestrians and avoid antagonising our neighbours. One of the things that would really help in any decision-making process would be to learn how many of you use a vehicle to bring your child(ren) to school and from which direction you come. To help to gather that information, next week we will be sending out a short survey for you to complete, the results of which we will pass on so that a measured and effective plan can be made. Alongside this, please continue to send in any thoughts you have, all of which will be shared.

It has also been suggested that photographs of vehicles showing number plates clearly which are parked illegally or inconsiderately should be collated. If you can keep sending these in via email marked 'parking offence', I can ensure they are passed on to the relevant body.

I hope that the extra parking you were signposted to in my email helps at drop-off and pick-up: :

- The National Trust car park on the moor operates free parking for 30 minutes.
- The car park next to the garage on Sutton Road has a number of spaces which can be used for up to 3 hours.
- The car park for the Kings Arms can be used, however, please vacate the car park quickly once you have collected your child to allow space for their customers.

Using the school car park is not permitted at drop-off or pick-up as this creates additional problems, notably increasing the danger to pedestrians as they make their way to and from the back gate as staff are already pulling in/out. However, if it helps, from 5pm if you are picking your child(ren) from wrap around care, you are very welcome to use it. We just ask that you avoid blocking in staff and remain mindful that vehicles may be leaving. The entrance is narrow with restricted visibility.
